A Note From the Director:

High school graduation is just around the corner. It is a celebration filled with excitement and anticipation that highlights important milestones our children have achieved as they move from adolescence toward adulthood. It is an occasion to be shared and enjoyed and many of our teens are already thinking about post-graduation parties with friends. For some, this also means thinking about alcohol and drug use. For many, the temptation to drink or use drugs is greater during this time than any other time during the year. Parents must be aware of the pressure their teens might be under and set appropriate boundaries and expectations about drinking and drug use.

Some Guidelines for Parents

Parties Your Kids Are Giving:

1. Expect and encourage calls from parents of teens confirming the party time and place.
2. Inform parents and teens that there will be no alcohol or drugs permitted in your home or on your property.
3. Plan on being home during the entire party and exercise proper supervision.
4. Inform teens that leaving and then returning to the party will not be permitted.
5. Call parents of teens who arrive at the party under the influence.
6. Know who is invited. Enforce a NO CRASHING policy!

Parties Your Kids Are Going To:

1. Call the parents of the party giver to:
 - Verify the occasion.
 - Make sure a parent will be home.Be sure that alcohol and drugs will not be permitted.
2. Agree upon a specific time your child will return home before your child leaves for the party.
3. Know how your teen will get to and from the party, and if needed, be available to provide transportation.
4. Tell your kids never to ride home with a driver (including an impaired adult) who has been drinking or is under the influence of drugs. Instruct them to call you for a ride if needed.
5. Be awake, or be sure to have them wake you when they arrive home.
6. Avoid spontaneous "sleepovers" when possible.

Local Prevention Council:

PARENTS WHO HOST LOSE THE MOST! It's Not Worth It.

"Kids will be kids. What's the harm if they have a few beers in the basement?
At least I know where they are."

Every day, studies reveal alarming evidence and long-term consequences of underage drinking. This is why it's important to address how and where youth get alcohol and what we as parents and concerned citizens can do to avert tragedy. Nationally, news sources have been reporting injuries and deaths that could have been avoided.

The Social Host Liability Laws:

Social host refers to adults or youth who **host** parties where alcohol is served on property they control. Through **social host liability laws**, adults and youth can be held responsible for these parties if underage people are served, regardless of who furnishes the alcohol, and even if the homeowner/parent is not home.

Private homes are the most common setting for **drinking** among high school seniors. All too often, home is also a teen's **source** for alcohol.

In a 2016 East Haddam survey, 89% of students report getting alcohol from a friend's home or their own; 32% of students report an older sibling or friends buys it or them. And the largest number of students state drinking alcohol at a friend's home, at parties, and at their own home.

Who can be held responsible?

- Adults, including family members and friends, who serve or provide alcohol to an underage youth
- Adults can be arrested if they allow underage consumption to occur with their knowledge, even if they did not provide the alcohol
- Parents and homeowners even if they are not on the premises and/or did not provide the alcohol.

Potential consequences:

- Individuals who permit minors to possess and/or consume alcohol may be fined, imprisoned or both
- You could be held civilly liable for injuries, alcohol poisoning, or deaths that occur

National and local incidents of underage partying have been highlighted recently in the news and on social media including a recent after-prom party arrest in Ellington, and an arrest of a father and son in New Canaan.

Well-meaning parents often host drinking parties on behalf of their children, either in the belief they can control the amount of alcohol a teen consumes or because they consider teen drinking inevitable and believe that their supervision can ensure the safety of the children involved. Truth is once parties start, the party begins to grow in numbers, and alcohol and unexpected substances are added to the situation, it can quickly spiral out of control and lead to devastating consequences.

It's not just about the adult legal aspect - kids need to learn that they are responsible for their actions.

Possession of alcohol by a minor on public or private property can face several penalties that may include:

- Infraction with fines up to \$500
- Possible 60-day license suspension if caught in possession on public property or a 30-day suspension if caught in possession on private property.
- If not licensed, minors must wait an additional 150 days before they are eligible.

If you're a parent, talk to your children early and often about the harmful effects of alcohol and other drugs. Inform your kids about Social Host Liability Laws, and the consequences of their actions. **Talk often. They hear you.**

East Haddam Confidential Tip Line: 860-873-5013

The East Haddam Police/Resident Troopers Office have established a confidential Tip-Line to receive information from concerned citizens about parties or gatherings where underage alcohol and/or drug use is happening. The Tip-Line is answered by a voice mail system and reviewed by a Police Officer. You will receive a return call only if you provide your contact information and request a callback. All information is kept confidential.
